Medical Cannabis rules proposed

Medical Association of the State of Alabama

The Alabama Board of Medical Examiners (BME) has issued for public comment rules for physician certification to recommend cannabis to patients with qualifying medical conditions. These rules provide the framework for physician application and eligibility for a certification permit and the actual physician requirements for certification for medical cannabis use.

A summary of the rules is as follows:

- 1. In order for a physician to be eligible for a certification permit, the physician must hold a current unrestricted Alabama medical license, an Alabama Controlled Substance Certificate, and a DEA license.
- 2. The physician must be registered and have access to the Prescription Drug Monitoring Program (PDMP) and the Alabama Medical Cannabis Patient Registry System
- 3. Physicians must complete an initial four-hour (4) CME course on medical cannabis and a two-hour (2) review course every two years.
- 4. The initial Certification Permit is \$300 and must be renewed annually with a fee of \$200
- 5. Per the legislative statute, certifying physicians will be prohibited from having

\$4.8 million grants to assist child abuse victims in Alabama

Gov. Kay Ivey has announced grants totaling \$4.8 million to help provide services to child victims of abuse, neglect and sexual assault, as well as provide training and resources to local law enforcement and nonprofit agencies.

The grants will help nonprofit organizations provide services including forensic interviews, mental health services, medical services referrals, advocacy, community education and prevention services.

"Young victims deserve to have the same professional services and help given to them as adult victims," Gov. Ivey said. "I commend these agencies that work daily to help those who have been harmed and work to prevent further abuse."

The Alabama Department of Economic and Community Affairs is administering the grants from funds made available by the U.S. Department of Justice.

"ADECA shares Gov. Ivey's dedication to protecting the most vulnerable among us by making sure child victims have the resources they need and that those helping the children are trained to provide the best assistance possible," ADECA Director Kenneth Boswell said.

988 suicide hotline getting \$282M to ease July launch

People in crisis and those trying to help them will have a new phone number – 988 – to reach the national suicide prevention network starting July 16. Federal health officials will be announcing more than \$280 million to smooth the transition from the current 10-digit number.

Three-digit dialing to reach suicide hotline counselors has long been a goal for mental health advocates, lawmakers in Congress, the Federal Communications Commission and the telecommunications industry. The new 988 number will also handle text and chat.

Mental health experts are hoping that the three-digit number will deliver a

breakthrough in assisting people in crisis who may otherwise try to harm themselves.

People who call, text, or chat 988 will be able to reach trained counselors who belong to the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline network. Counselors at more than 180 local centers listen to people in crisis and provide support, connecting them with other services as may be needed.

Of the \$282 million, \$177 million will go to bolster and expand the existing crisis network's operations and telephone infrastructure. The rest of the money, \$105 million, will go to build up staffing at local call centers.

Suicide attempts result in more than

300,000 people seen in hospital emergency departments for self-harm injuries. Rates of suicide rose steadily over much of the last 20 years, and it remains a leading cause of premature death for people from their teens well into their 50s.

Recently, the FCC voted unanimously to require phone companies to support texting to 988 as well. Commissioners said nowadays many people may be more inclined to text and the choice of voice or text should make no difference when someone in distress is trying to find help.

a financial interest related to the certification of a patient's qualifying medical condition (other than fees charged for medical services rendered)

- 6. Physicians can only certify qualifying medical conditions for which they have education and training to treat patients in their normal course of practice.
- 7. Physicians must follow specific documentation requirements including minimum standards for patient records, written patient consent, and submissions to the State patient registry.
- Certifying physicians must provide an annual report to the BME with their observations of the effectiveness of medical cannabis.

Qualifying Medical Conditions Per the Legislative Statute

- Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD)
- · Cancer-related cachexia, nausea or

- vomiting, weight loss, or chronic pain
- Crohn's Disease
- Depression
- Epilepsy or a condition causing seizures
 HIV/AIDS-related nausea or weight
- loss
- Panic disorder
- Parkinson's disease
- Persistent nausea that is not significantly responsive to traditional treatment, except for nausea related to pregnancy, cannabis-induced cyclical vomiting syndrome, or 24 cannabinoid hyperemesis syndrome
- Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD)
- Sickle Cell Anemia
- Spasticity associated with a motor neuron disease, including Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis
- Spasticity associated with Multiple Sclerosis or a spinal cord injury

- A terminal illness
- Tourette's Syndrome
- A condition causing chronic or intractable pain in which conventional therapeutic intervention and opiate therapy is contraindicated or has proved ineffective

APA News Briefs

December Course of the Month – Exploration of How to Care for Pregnant Women with Psychiatric Illness

The risk for development of a mood or psychotic disorder is highest in females during their reproductive years, resulting in a high likelihood that pregnancy and psychiatric illness will intersect. CDC report spurs APA to call for improved access to treatment

APA released a statement calling for improved access to treatment for substance use disorders (SUDs) in the wake of a CDC report that detailed over 100,000 overdose deaths between April 2020 and April 2021. APA also called for collaboration between Congress and addiction treatment experts to develop and implement science-based policies and programs to end the opioid epidemic, more support for training of clinicians to treat people with SUDs. *You can read the full statement here*.

Build Back Better Act includes significant funding for mental health and substance use disorder programs

APA released a statement praising the U.S. House passage of the Build Back Better Act, a \$2 trillion spending package that contains significant funding for mental health and substance use disorder programs. Among the health care provisions that would be expanded by the bill are Mental Health Parity, funding to grow the Behavioral Health Workforce, funding for mobile crisis services and the 9-8-8 hotline, and an extension to the Children's Health Insurance Program. *You can learn more about the bill and read more about its mental health provisions here*.
